

In order to promote and protect overall health and development, particularly, menstrual hygiene practices among women in Prisons, Project Shakti witnessed installation of sanitary napkin vending machines and incinerators across 12 prisons of Haryana namely, Yamuna Nagar, Ambala, Kurukshetra, Panipat, Sonipat, Bhiwani, Gurugram, Narnaul, Sirsa, Jind, Hisar and Kaithal.

India Vision Foundation along with Spark Minda Foundation organized virtual as well as in person awareness sessions during the year. These workshops were enlightening and interactive wherein menstrual concerns of female inmates were acknowledged and numerous taboos encompassing the topic were discussed and resolved. One of the objectives of conducting these sessions was to break the silence regarding reproductive/ menstrual health concerns faced by female inmates inside prisons, and destigmatizing menstruation. Pertinent information related to the science behind periods was discussed. Some very old misconceptions that had been blindly followed till date were busted supporting logical reasoning. The inmates were informed about the correct way of using sanitary napkins and were encouraged to use safer menstrual practices to prevent life threatening diseases and infections.








