





### **Project Shakti: Quarterly Report**

#### July - September 2024

Project Shakti is a joint initiative between the India Vision Foundation and the Spark Minda Foundation, aimed at promoting menstrual hygiene practices among female inmates in prisons. This project ensures easy access to resources in alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals. Following the successful implementation of Project Shakti in the prisons of Haryana, Uttarakhand, and Delhi, there arose a need to replicate a similar model in Uttar Pradesh, leading to the extension of support to four zones: Lucknow, Varanasi, Meerut, and Gorakhpur.



#### Present Status of Project Shakti - Uttar Pradesh 🧩





On May 28, 2024, in recognition of Menstrual Hygiene Day, a conference was held to empower women in prisons through menstrual hygiene management, featuring Dr. Kiran Bedi the Chief Guest. The event included a rapid-fire panel discussion with Dr. Kiran Bedi, and contributions from Mr. Jai Kishan Chhillar, Ms. Sarika Minda, and Mr. Bhomik Shah, moderated by Mr Prayeen Karn, A key announcement made was regarding the provision of menstrual hygiene resources in 71 across Uttar Pradesh over three years, beginning with 22 district prisons in the first year. This initiative aims to enhance the health and dignity of female inmates in prison environments.



#### **Inauguration Of Project Shakti**

Project Shakti, UP was officially inaugurated at Nari Bandi Niketan, Lucknow, with Chief Guest Smt. Meenakshi Sonkar, Additional District & Sessions Judge of the Allahabad High Court, presiding over the event. Notable attendees included Mr. Anil Gautam, Superintendent of Nari Bandi Niketan, and representatives from Minda Corporation, India Vision Foundation, Bharat Cares, and ASSOCHAM.



## **Project Objectives**

Project Shakti will follow a three-pronged intervention strategy of **Access -Educate** - **Empower** to support female inmates maintain their menstrual health and hygiene inside the prison by facilitating access and usage to Safer options of menstrual health and hygiene products.



#### Access

To ensure and facilitate easy access to safe "Menstrual Health and Hygiene" products, and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) infrastructure inside the prison.



#### **Educate**

To educate female inmates by conducting **systematic awareness sessions** and demystifying the stigma and taboos around Mensuration.



#### **Empower**

Empower: To ensure the practice of safe mensuration with dignity even inside the prison and to bring a shift behavioural change by practicing hygienic options and informed choices of managing "Menstrual Health Management and Hygiene" in prisons and even after release.







# Installation of Sanitary Napkins Vending Machines and Training

## Installation and demonstrative training of vending machine.

The installation of sanitary pad vending Uttar Pradesh machines in prisons involved strategically placing fourteen machines across various locations, including District Jail Lucknow, Nari Bandi Niketan in Ghaziabad, Gautam Varanasi, Budh Nagar, Gyanpur, Ghazipur, Jaunpur, Mirzapur, Gorakhpur, Basti, Deoria, Mau, and Azamgarh. This initiative aimed to facilitate convenient access to sanitary for female inmates, pads thereby promoting better menstrual hygiene the practices correctional within facilities.



The vending machines were specifically designed to ensure continuous availability of sanitary products, addressing a critical need for female inmates. Following the installation, the project team conducted comprehensive demonstrations for both inmates and prison staff to familiarize them with the operation of the machines.

This initiative not only enhances access to menstrual hygiene products but also contributes to the overall well-being and dignity of female inmates.





## Project Implementation

India Vision Foundation and Spark Minda Foundation extended their support to Uttar Pradesh prisons. In order to guarantee consistent access to necessary hygiene supplies, they set up 14 sanitary napkin vending machines and supplied 14,000 sanitary napkins. In addition, 14 awareness programs debunked stereotypes and taught female prisoners how to manage their menstrual hygiene. In addition, 45 inmate employees received training on how to keep the vending machines in good working order and assist with continuous awareness campaigns.

The initiative focused on educating female inmates about menstrual health and hygiene. Trainers engaged in activities like the **Bindi activity** to enhance the understanding of the menstrual cycle & symptoms, **clothes coloring activity** demonstrated how light-colored fabric can help identify stains, essential for maintaining hygiene. Light colors allow for quick detection of changes, aiding in health monitoring and early detection of potential infections and last is **menstrual product activity** aimed to educate participants about various products, helping them understand their uses and importance for maintaining hygiene.








## **Trainings & Workshops**



#### Reached - 821



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During the quarter, a total of fourteen awareness sessions on "Menstrual Health and Hygiene" were conducted for 821 female inmates across various correctional facilities, including District Jail Lucknow, Nari Bandi Niketan, Ghaziabad, and others in Gautam Budh Nagar, Varanasi, Gyanpur, Jaunpur, Ghazipur, Mirzapur, Gorakhpur, Basti, Deoria, Mau, and Azamgarh. These sessions were facilitated by the Bharat Cares team and focused on critical topics related to menstruation.

The trainers provided comprehensive information on menstrual hygiene practices, debunked prevalent myths, discussed strategies for managing discomfort, and emphasized overall well-being during menstrual cycles. These sessions fostered an environment conducive to open dialogue, allowing participants to pose questions and express concerns regarding menstruation.

The primary objective was to empower female inmates with accurate, evidence-based information to enable them to manage their menstrual health effectively. The collaborative efforts of India Vision Foundation, Spark Minda Foundation, Assocham, and Bharat Cares underscored a shared commitment to enhancing menstrual health and hygiene among female inmates. To reinforce their learning, menstrual hygiene booklets were distributed following each session, further enriching their understanding and improving their quality of life.




















#### **Feedback**
