





Project Shakti: Quarterly Report

October - December 2024

Project Shakti is a collaborative initiative between the India Vision Foundation and the Spark Minda Foundation, focusing on promoting menstrual hygiene practices among female inmates in prisons. By ensuring easy access to essential resources, this project aligns with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Dedicated to improving menstrual hygiene for incarcerated females, Project Shakti prioritizes their health and dignity. After successfully expanding to 14 district prisons in Uttar Pradesh, including Lucknow, Nari Bandi Niketan, Gautam Budh Nagar, Ghaziabad, Varanasi, Gyanpur, Jaunpur, Ghazipur, Mirzapur, Gorakhpur, Basti, Deoria, Mau, and Azamgarh, the foundation is now reaching out to 3 District Prison Maharajganj, Sonbhadra, and Siddharthnagar. Total extended 17 District Prison in this quarter.

This expansion has empowered more females to lead healthier, more dignified lives while addressing a critical and often neglected issue within prison facilities.





Access

To ensure and facilitate safe to easy access Health "Menstrual and Hygiene" products, water, sanitation, and (WASH) hygiene infrastructure inside the prison.



Educate

To educate female inmates by conducting systematic awareness sessions and demystifying the stigma and taboos around Mensuration.



Empower

To ensure the practice of safe mensuration with dignity even inside the prison and to bring a shift behavioural change by practicing hygienic options and informed choices of managing "Menstrual Health Management and Hygiene" in prisons and even after release.



Project Implementation

The Spark Minda Foundation has taken a remarkable step in supporting prisons across Uttar Pradesh by addressing the critical need for menstrual hygiene. As part of this impactful initiative, the foundation supplied an impressive 21,700 sanitary napkins to 17 prisons, including Lucknow, Nari Bandi Niketan, Gautam Budh Nagar, Ghaziabad, Varanasi, Gyanpur, Jaunpur, Ghazipur, Mirzapur, Sonbhadra, Gorakhpur, Basti, Deoria, Mau, Azamgarh, Maharajganj, Siddharth Nagar. To further enhance accessibility, they installed three sanitary napkin vending machines in the prisons of Sonbhadra, Maharajganj and Siddharth Nagar, empowering inmates with convenient access to essential hygiene products. Also, both inmates and prison staff were trained on how to operate the vending machines effectively.

With the collaboration of India Vision Foundation and Spark Minda Foundation complementing this logistical support and conducted awareness sessions on Menstrual health and hygiene to educate female inmates. This initiatives can empower females to understand their health better, take proactive steps for their well-being, and seek medical advice whenever required.

This comprehensive approach not only ensured access to essential hygiene products but also nurtured awareness, dignity, and well-being among female inmates. It marked a significant step toward empowering female inmates and enhancing their overall health and self-esteem.








Trainings & Workshops







During the quarter, three awareness sessions on "Menstrual Health and Hygiene" were held for 138 female inmates and seven female prison staff at District Jail Maharajganj, Sonbhadra, and Siddharth Nagar. Facilitated by Bharat Cares, these sessions covered menstrual hygiene practices, debunking myths, managing discomfort, and overall well-being. Trainers provided comprehensive information, including the proper use of menstrual products and understanding body anatomy.

The collaborative efforts of India Vision Foundation, Spark Minda Foundation, Assocham, and Bharat Cares aimed to empower female inmates with accurate, evidence-based information for effective menstrual health management. Activities helped participants recognize the health significance of menstrual blood droplets and encouraged proactive steps for their well-being.

Menstrual hygiene booklets were distributed to reinforce learning, further improving quality of life and well-being. These combined efforts underscored a commitment to enhancing menstrual health and hygiene among female inmates, thereby supporting their overall health and self-esteem.
